Why are we not addressing vulnerability?

- Vulnerability
 - Not addressing the underlying drivers

 discrimination, equity issues that
 relate to gender, age, political
 affiliation, ethnic group...
- Too sensitive, too controversial, too much work!



Vulnerability and equity

Poorly designed climate measures may affect some poor and disadvantaged people adversely, exacerbating inequity and vulnerability.

- Reinforcement of existing inequity and vulnerability
- Introduction of new risks and sources of vulnerability
- Redistribution of vulnerability

n conclusion...

- Adaptation is at a cross-roads: we need to bring it back to its radical roots
- Technocratic perspectives on adaptation obscure the social dimensions of vulnerability, suggesting that quick fixes are possible
- Incremental adaptation is generally insufficient to trigger the changes we need, but most adaptation is incremental
- By framing adaptation as something that can happen outside of other crucial development processes, the space for unsustainable adaptation becomes larger
